from darkness to light

This past year, God cared for hurting and homeless people in our community through your generosity to Southern New Hampshire Rescue Mission.

People come here in trouble they cannot escape alone, and God shows up to rescue them. I cling to the verses in the Apostle Paul's letter to the Colossians (1:13-14): "For He has rescued us from the kingdom of darkness and transferred us into the Kingdom of His dear Son, who purchased our freedom and forgave our sins."

Every day, we receive heartbreaking calls from men and women with nowhere to turn. We meet their desperation with truth, love and genuine concern. As God directs, you and I become light in their darkness.

This annual report is just a snapshot of God's work through you. Thank you for helping proclaim the Good News of Jesus Christ to people who desperately need to be rescued from darkness.

core services

meeting the basic needs of those who come for help.

Come for a Meal and a Message

People come to the Mission because they are hungry. They also receive a message of hope and encouragement from God's Word.

With your help, we serve breakfast every day during the week, lunch four days a week and dinner on weekends. Also, everyone in our R12 LifeChange Discipleship and Transitional Employment Programs receives meals each day.



In total in 2018, you provided:

- 30,710 delicious meals to hungry and homeless people in Nashua.
- Memorial Day, Independence Day and Labor Day community cookouts for more than 600 needy people.
- A Gospel message of hope to all who joined us for a meal.

Men's Emergency Shelter

Every night, up to 40 men find a safe respite from the streets and weather in our Chestnut Street facility.

Men stay in the warmth and safety of this place for up to 60 consecutive nights. They receive guidance for work, housing and health care, along with the opportunity to address real life change through our R12 LifeChange Program or Transitional Employment Program.

In 2018, you helped provide 12,775 nights of safe shelter to 191 homeless men.

R12 LifeChange Discipleship Program

Men who are serious about life change join our 12-month program and commit themselves to:

- A new life in Christ and growth in faith.
- Participation in a local church with godly relationships, mentors and a sense of community.
- Training in life skills for resume building, job interviewing and individual change in specific areas of character building.
- Establishment of stable and sustainable income and affordable housing.

In 2018, we were privileged to minister to 25 men in our R12 LifeChange Discipleship Program.

Transitional Employment Program

We encourage homeless men to stay with us and develop biblical financial principles as they save money toward permanent housing. They develop a sense that God should be honored in how we manage the resources He has provided.

19 men participated in our Transitional Employment Program in 2018.

Gift Center

Every other Tuesday, needy individuals and families in our community received:

- Donated clothing, footwear, personal hygiene products, blankets, coats, flashlights, books and other items.
- Fruits, vegetables, dry foods, meat, nutritious drinks and other food items, donated by generous friends, Hannaford, Sam's Club and the NH Food Bank. More than 168,000 lbs. of food were distributed in 2018.

Transitional Employment Program

I felt like a wet dog out in the rain," Peter remembers. After years of making bad financial decisions, he was separated from his wife, unemployed and homeless.

Then Peter came to the Mission. "The moment I walked in the door, I heard someone talking about taking responsibility, and it hit me like a lightning bolt."

Peter joined our Transitional Employment Program and opportunities began to open up for him. He joined a local church and was baptized. He found a job and began saving money. Three months later, he says, "I'm in a better position than I ever hoped I would be. This place is set up to help you achieve success."

R12 LifeChange Discipleship Program

A fter counseling homeless people for 17 years, Sean knew where to go for help when his own drinking got out of control. "I could have gone to a 28-day program, but I needed to get right with God." Sean chose the Mission's R12 LifeChange Discipleship Program.

"It's not a soft program. You got to be real if you want to heal," Sean says. "I used to lean on my own understanding. Now I go straight to God."

Sean graduated from the program in September. He looks forward to being a case manager again and is reconciling with his family. Without your help, Sean says, "I wouldn't be the kind of man who can provide for my son."

Men's Emergency Shelter

A lbert, a retiree, expected to live the rest of his life in the family house he grew up in. But the house was in his sister's name, and when she passed, her husband took ownership of it and set Albert out on the street.


With little money and in poor health, Albert came to the Mission. Here, he has meals, a comfortable place to live and a second chance—at 68! "It's an opportunity to better myself," he says. "It's a first step."

With help from his case manager, Albert is looking for a new place to call home. In the meantime, he says, "Everybody here wants the best for me. I'm happy to be here."


"Be humble and serve your heart out!"
