With help from caring people like you, Southern New Hampshire Rescue Mission has provided shelter to homeless men for more than 18 years. And we are grateful.

Many women are also in desperate need of a safe place, help and hope — and there is very limited shelter space in the Nashua area for them.

ON THE HOR FOR HOMELI


For three years, John, a dedicated volunteer at Southern New Hampshire Rescue Mission, has answered voicemails to the Coordinated Access Hotline — voicemails from men and women who have nowhere to go. Every time he prepares to answer the hotline, John prays, "Dear God, let it be You this person hears. Let it be my voice with Your words."

John tells us he had been able to use God's words to comfort a woman in distress that very morning. "She was forced to leave her living arrangement because of domestic violence and was sleeping in her car at a Walmart. She just needed a safe, warm place to stay." After listening to her story, John arranged for her to go to the Nashua Soup Kitchen, the only place in Nashua that shelters women and families as well as men.

"There's a desperate need for a women's shelter here in the Nashua area," John says. "I get about a dozen calls from homeless women every week, more as the weather gets colder. I've unfortunately had to tell a lot of women there's nothing available and to just call the Soup Kitchen every morning to see if they have a bed for them. I've tried referring them to Manchester and other shelters outside the area, but they're in the same position."

John hopes to be able to soon welcome women to their own shelter at Southern New Hampshire Rescue Mission. "Over the last couple of years, I've discussed a women's rescue mission with a lot of professional women who have an interest in providing Bible studies, counseling and working

pro bono. They're ready to jump in and provide these services. They want to get involved with homeless women as I've been able to get involved with the men."

Plans are now underway for Hope House, a shelter for up to ten women that will provide the same services men have at the Mission. "We're a Christian ministry. We address people's spiritual needs as well as their physical and mental needs. Only God can solve a lot of the core issues that homeless people face. We address that with men here at the Mission and, God willing, someday we'll be able to address it with women, too."

CHOOSING FAITH OVER FEAR

If 2020 could be defined by any one word, for many people it would be "fear" — of the COVID-19 virus, of losing family members, of the economic fallout from the shutdowns.

At Southern New Hampshire Rescue Mission, with God's blessing and your faithfulness, we are able to choose faith over fear, continuing to serve the hungry and homeless in the Nashua area. This year...

- Our gift center provided almost 12,000 meals to our needy community of men, women and children during August, September and October alone, while the pandemic raged and needs were the greatest for those most vulnerable.
- We served approximately 1,200 repeat guests from August through September who came to our Gift Center every other Tuesday for their weekly groceries.
- We served approximately 131 new guests from August through September who came to us for the first time to discover much needed help and hope. They did not go hungry!
- Our clothing distribution remained open with a steady supply of coats, socks, pants, shirts, shoes and other items to guests in our emergency shelter and families in our community.
- We also served 60 wonderful Christmas meals to our hungry neighbors, although we provided the meals in containers to go.

We are blessed!

That's why we remained diligent during the pandemic in our response to keep our facility and community safe. We received a generous donation of a fogging machine and supplies, air purifier, masks, hand sanitizer, wipes, etc. We have a regular schedule for disinfecting the entire Mission. We incorporated protocols to take temperatures of all sheltered guests each night during check-in. Finally, we have established a quarantine area to isolate anyone exhibiting symptoms.

Our facility is as safe as we can make it in order for us to remain open and available to provide homeless assistance to all those in need. Keep praying!
